



ALTERNATIVE CLASS DAYS I RECAP

Linocut Stamps and Doodles

In this workshop, students explored the basic foundations of printmaking, and patterns in global art traditions from zentangles, to moorish tile patterns, mandalas, and more. The students learned basic concepts surrounding shape, form, texture, and repeating pattern making through mindful doodling and linocut stamping; sharpening creativity and providing stress relief. We started conducting pattern studies through their doodles, and carved a final stamp created on a linocut. Some objectives from the workshop included enhancing the technical skills in relief printmaking, understanding the relation between linocut and drawing, layouts, developing composition, cutting the block, registration and proofing, and printing the linocut by hand in black.

It was wonderful to see students approach art intuitively, celebrating the imperfect and restoring confidence in their own work by drawing their own way.







We Are Happy Potters!

The Happy Potters had an enjoyable and relaxing morning with Ms. Bing Bernardo Gaw of Pottery Nuvali who taught the group the basics of handbuilt pottery. The calm and nurturing atmosphere in her studio were perfect ingredients for creativity to flow and stream out into pots, plates, mugs and clay toys. That is why, Day 2 of Alternative Class Days was equally productive as the Happy Potters wedged, molded, pinched, slabbed, slipped and scored.

Here are some insights and takeaways from our Happy Potters.

"I thoroughly enjoyed the pottery session. It definitely exceeded my expectations. We learned a lot of basic techniques and how to use the different equipment while applying it to our own products (which we were given much freedom with). I had lots of fun!" - Francesca, Grade 11.

"I learned the basics of pottery, and how to make use of these newly learned skills on future projects."- Brielle, Grade 9

"I was able to learn different techniques such as the pinching method and slab method. I found this experience very relaxing." - Maya, Grade 11

This is the third time we had Pottery during the ACD. The positive feedback inspires us to continue learning about this art and industry. Who knows where this will take us? Our only limitation is imagination.









ALTERNATIVE CLASS DAYS | RECAP

Quiapo-Chinatown Cultural Heritage Tour

14 students across Grade 9-12 with 3 faculty and 3 staff embarked on a one-day journey. The destination was Quiapo - Binondo. It started with a tour at of San Sebastian, then proceeded to Quiapo Church, the Golden Mosque and Binondo.

The tour had the following objectives: (1) expose the BA students to the richness of Filipino, Muslim and Chinese heritage (from San Sebastian Church, Quiapo Underpass, Quiapo Church, Quiapo Mosque and Binondo Chinatown); (2) make students appreciate the authenticity of local businesses, cultures and traditions, ways of life inherent to the common Filipino masses; and (3) provide students the avenues to gain first-hand information on the history of Manila City landscape as shared by the locals in the area.

And here are some of the feedback from students:

- The culture of Quiapo-Chinatown is very rich and diverse. There's a sense of community and a rich history at the heart of Manila. It's so interesting to see how Manila became how it is now, and the Manila which is different from the one I'm familiar with. Also, I find it interesting how religion brings people together Grade 12
- I learned that my life isn't so bad compared with the people I saw living on the streets. I love learning about our history and the different cultures we have as Filipinos. It's good to be open-minded when exploring new places.

- The significance of multiculturalism seemed to be the overarching theme of the cultural trip, as both the Catholic
 priest and the Imam emphasized the need for greater exposure to and dialogue between both Muslims and Catholics in
 order to foster understanding and dispel xenophobic perceptions. Grade 11
- This ACD experience exposed me to the rich cultural history of Filipinos with real life experiences in Quiapo and Binondo. As it was my first time visiting both places, the tour opened my eyes and I learned many historical facts about churches and places I would have never known, dated decades and centuries back. I was able to observe historical architecture and appreciate the techniques used to allow the structures to stand the test of time. I was able to appreciate the Chinese and Filipino culture, especially the food. Most importantly, I was able to see and understand the daily life, livelihood of Filipinos and environmental struggles affecting them. Grade 11
- Overall, I enjoyed learning about our culture, the faith of the Philippines and tasting all the food. I also enjoyed being able to do this with friends and the independence we had. The entire experience was really enjoyable and informative. Grade 9

Paper Engineering

The goals of this workshop were to introduce the participants to the art of paper engineering through the tools and techniques of the craft, and to develop new skills as we learned how to bring paper to life with interactive mechanisms. Everyone was able to apply their new knowledge and creativity as they set out to work on their own output.

Students shared the following insights in relation to this workshop:

I did enjoy the activity because I could use my own skills that I had just learned, to make art! The activity was very interactive and was easy to learn from because Ms. Amy provided an instructional booklet that allowed us to practice. I think that we did have enough time for a simple pop-up, but I did have to work at home. So maybe next time, more time could be given.- Isabella F.

In this ACD, I learned the basic skills of pop-up art. I got to understand the craft better which helped me to create my own piece using what I learned. Through this activity, I found my strength in crafting small art pieces and improved on my weakness of cutting along the lines. This activity was extremely fun and I enjoyed it very much. We had more than enough materials which allowed us to create anything and expand our imaginations. Our teacher, Ms. Amy was experienced, helpful, and fun to work with. I am glad I was able to meet her and learn from her. -Nina E.

Knowing that I'm not that good at working with paper, I was able to learn how to do it with my own touch. I have a bit of a problem when it comes to strategizing all the ideas I had in mind, but the fact that I had many ideas proved that this workshop really enhanced my creative thinking. -Mandy DP







Survival Cooking

The College Survival Cooking workshop aimed to give students the basic cooking skills that will allow even the most cooking-adverse person some success with a limited kitchen and pantry. Cooking the basic egg, an introduction to the one-pot rice meal, upgrading the instant noodles, and learning how to make adobo were part of the workshop basics that prepared the students for their pantry-raid cook off which was the highlight of the workshop. The students exhibited their new-found skills and creativity as they prepared an assortment of dishes which were sampled and evaluated by a panel of judges.

Buhay Biñanense:

Buhay Biñanense was an Alternative Class Day activity where a group of 15 students, in grades 11 and 12, went to the different heritage sites in Biñan, as well as famed restaurants in the city that serve local food and Filipino cuisine. The goal of the field trip is to introduce them to different historical and heritage sites in Biñan so that they can appreciate the local culture and knowledge of the city where The Beacon Academy is located. They went to the school where Jose Rizal studied, The Alberto's Mansion, The Biñan Studies Center and Museum, The City Plaza, Lutong Henerasyon restaurant, the Binan public market and Chef RV's Cakes and Pastries.

All the students who went on this tour were amazed and surprised to discover a lot of things in Biñan. The life of Rizal and how prominent his family was in Biñan made an impression. The preservation of some historical houses (Bahay na Bato) was a laudable program of the Biñan LGU. The business industries, especially the city market, is dubbed as the Divisoria of the South. Our Griffins enjoyed the 100 peso challenge in the public market because they were able to speak Filipino and Tagalog, as well as apply decision making and practical Math skills. They loved the different varieties of food in Lutong Henerasyon and lined up for puto Biñan and special bibingka at Chef RV's.

All the fun and homely experiences on that special day is are worth remembering during about their High School days. Our teachers and staff chaperones hope that they bring with them this memory of Biñan as most of them are off to college in the NCR and abroad.







Intramuros to Luneta

The Intramuros to Luneta Alternative Class Day tour happened on 30 January 2024. The purpose of the activity was to give students a learning experience outside the classroom that will allow them to get a feel of our history within the walls of Intramuros, and experience park life in Luneta.

The tour began at Fort Santiago where the students met up with their guide who regaled them with stories and fun anecdotes rooted in historical record as they made their way to the Manila Cathedral. At the Cathedral they appreciated the architecture and religious artifacts, and at the museum, they immersed themselves in the rich art. Through this tour, students got a glimpse of how Catholicism preserved the Hispanic heritage of the Philippines, and a real appreciation for historical knowledge and our historical sites. Connections to their Individuals and Societies, Design, English and Filipino classes were also made. Students came away with thinking about about how we can better improve the maintenance and preservation of our unique cultural heritage.
